Q4. Voting on the Options Analysis to go to the State for consideration was not an easy decision. A number of councillors, myself included spoke against Light Rail as a mode. It was great news that Light Rail was not the preferred option. By allowing the State to review public transport in this corridor it has opened the door to public transport reviews for the Northern Sunshine Coast and the Hinterland. I will also look to review the Transport Levy funds to see if any can be utilised for interim improvements or trials of public transport servicing previously unserviced areas..

5 What do you think should be the priority for better public transport in the future?

Response:

The region requires both an improved internal public transport system as well as an efficient system to Brisbane and beyond. An internal public transport system would have a more frequent impact to the community as it would provide an alternative to traffic congestion on a daily basis.

- Q.11 Areas of densification require careful controls. Clear direction on heights, where height is located, setbacks, site cover and design.
- Do you think the current planning decision making process is too lenient toward developers, especially in regard to site coverage, set backs and density?

	The current scheme is lenient to anyone who makes an application. The current
	scheme's provisions for site cover, set backs and density too often allow
	applications to rely on performance outcomes instead of acceptable outcomes.

These areas of a new plan need to be more prescriptive to ensure expectations are met.

13 Do you think all Development Applications should require Council to notify all adjoining neighbours?

If YES, what will you do to try and make this happen?
It is typically the applicant's responsibility to make notifications. It would be too onerous for Council to advise owners of every application as many applications are very minor in nature - a shed, a relocated driveway, a residential house on a vacant block, an extension. However, it would be good if code assessable applications that demonstrate quite an increase/change in nature be required to advise neighbours similar to impact assessable applications. A number of councillors post recent applications to also advise their communities of applications if they don't have searches set up on Developmenti.

14 As a Divisional Councillor, what will you do to achieve better development outcomes for the region and your Division?

Response:

I have consistently voted against applications that did not adhere to the town plan. I have worked with the good design team and the planning team to instill where possible, better design outcomes to be integrated into the draft planning scheme.
