Response:

Q6. I do acknowledge that some new arrivals want to live close to the beach, and we need to find a way to facilitate this without increasing the urban footprint. Some densification will be necessary - but not 'at the beach'. We need to plan to improve overall liveability.

Q7. It is not 'how many storeys' - it is the overall height of the building. The current planning scheme and the current hard cap are appropriate - we need to ensure we 'stick to the plan'.

8 Do you think housing densification should occur along the Heavy Passenger Rail Corridor rather than the Mass Transit Coastal Corridor?

YES/NO Yes	Explain why? Increasing densification should occur close to existing public transport infrastructure (in consultation with communities), and away from the coastal strip. This will reduce impact on our natural and built environment. The coastal strip is one of our main attractions, and it is vunerable to extreme weather events/climate change.

	There are far too many instances of the planning scheme being overridden. The
	planning scheme needs reinforcing and applied correctly. State Laws need an
	overhaul (so consider this when voting in the State Election in October 2024) so
	that wealthy developers can't easily go to the Planning and Environment Court
	to have Council decisions overturned. This happens quite frequently, and we are

told that Council does not have the resources to fight these developers in Court.

The whole system is flawed.

13 Do you think all Development Applications should require Council to notify all adjoining neighbours?

Minor development applications that do not impact neighbours do not need notification. However, when development applications do impact neighbours and the broader community, and Council should automatically notify residents by electronic means (where known) of all code assessible planning applications within 500m in High Density, to 10km in rural, on a sliding scale. Distance should be quadrupled for impact assessable applications to capture more of the community, thus reflecting the greater impact

14 As a Divisional Councillor, what will you do to achieve better development outcomes for the region and your Division?

Response:

The Council needs to take in the social and environmental impacts in all planning and development decisions. The 'pursuit of sustainability' creates opportunities for growth and adaptation in the design of buildings and other infrastructure and Council should 'lead by example'.

I will advocate for a First Nations Liaison to be in Planning and Development to ensure consultation with Traditional Owners to conserve and celebrate places with cultural significance.
