1 Do you think two public transport spinal networks (Heavy Rail from Beerwah to Maroochydore and a Mass Transit system from Maroochydore to Birtinya) with feeder networks running to them, is the best public transport system for the region?

YES/NO Yes	If YES what? The Sunshine Coast Integrated Transport Strategy (ITS) pays little attention to the north of the region. There is a Northern Sunshine Coast Transport Strategy in development that needs to be part of the ITS. The current ITS also needs to be reviewed as it is dependent on an incomplete planning scheme, uncommitted funding, the outcome of forthcoming Local, State and Federal elections and assumptions about population growth and housing needs that are unconvincing. The SEQ Regional Plan is also under review. I would advocate that all plans and strategies at Federal, State and Local levels are aligned. This doesn't mean the Sunshine Coast needs to cave in to State priorites.

4 What will you do to improve public transport now?

Response:

One estimate is that a combined total of \$40m+ has been spent on studies, strategies and "community consultation". Imagine how much could have been achieved with these funds on alternatives such as supporting modal shifts and negotiating improved services with the State Government. Before we spend a cent more on studies we could improve public transport throughout the region starting NOW by timetabling more buses more frequently. I would support a free ride trial for children and pensioners and look towards low-cost public transport for all. Simultaneously we could start on known road improvement opportunities that would assist public and private transport flow.

We should work with our existing transport infrastructure, encouraging modal shifts and use transport levy funds for trials as was the commitment when the levy was introduced. The mindset behind recent transport strategies, plans, drafts and the like seems to assume away government responsibility to address public good and to shift responsibilities to the private sector. I do not support this. I also do not support the many apparent TMR and Council assumptions that seem to suggest that the citizens of the Sunshine Coast can't or won't change their behaviour. I see the opposite - people choosing more and more to live by stronger environmental ethics everyday, being outside and getting more exercise using bikes and scooters, shopping locally, working from home etc. Transport planning needs a mindshift.

5 What do you think should be the priority for better public transport in the future?

Response:

Technologies are changing fast and by the time the next strategy is produced it could be another twelve years and a very different world. By then much more sustainable, environmentally friendly options could be available supporting climate change advances and rational, informed

thinking about transport planning in the twenty-first century. Gentle density increases could mean that the need for big engineering solutions and big developers can be rethought.

More highly populated areas measure the success of public transport based on user numbers but in the hinterland we need connectivity aswell. We also need more taxis and courtesy buses. I would convene discussions amongst people outside the usual inner circle who have been involved to date to break this "getting nowhere fast" impasse and get some practical, innovative and relevant solutions that are future looking and affordable.

I will not support any densification that leads to coastal and habitat intrusions and would aim to insure funds spent actually achieve the opposite such as turtle-friendly lighting along coastal paths and 'no-go zones' during nesting season.

Response:

Firstly I would work with the Council and Councillors to fully review existing community engagement practices. I believe the commodifying of these processes has led to too much ticking of boxes and not enough rigorous, evidence-based information that assists both the citizens of the Sunshine Coast and the Councillors. Using community consultation statistics about numbers of meetings held and numbers of "likes" is tokenistic and not good enough. The community wants to be informed and educated as we tackle complex issues. I would support community groups, organisations and all citizens to be involved in decision-making rather than feel deliberately excluded as some do now. The existing engagement practices are not going deep enough. I would "lift the lid off City Hall" - meaning I would open all Councillor meetings and aim to provide greater access to professional staff other than when legal requirements do not allow. If our strategic decisions are based on real evidence informed by great achievements (internationally, nationally, statewide and locally), citizens who are commited, trust and respect, we will grow and evolve together as a community and a place to achieve better outcomes at every step.
